Professor Andrew Baker is the British Heart Foundation Professor of Translational Cardiovascular Science, Gustav Born Chair of Vascular Biology and Head of Centre for Cardiovascular Science. Professor Baker's lab is focussed on the mechanisms that control vascular damage and how to influence repair and regeneration of the vascular system using innovative therapies. To this end they developed an innovative gene therapy approach to prevent pathological vascular remodelling associated with coronary artery bypass graft failure and are pursuing this at the clinical interface (in Golden Jubilee National Hospital) – a local story of truly innovative bench-to-bedside translational research!
