Welcome to the BJA Research Forum newsletter for Spring 2020! This is to update you on the work of the Anaesthetic Research Society and the BJA Research Forum. The last meeting was a joint venture with the National Institute of Academic Anaesthesia (NIAA) and the Peri-operative Medicine Clinical Trials Network (POMCTN), supported by the Royal College of Anaesthetists: **Anaesthesia Research 2019.**

The meeting was really well attended by members of all groups and societies, trainees and interested colleagues from anaesthesia and its related specialties. There was a focus on peri-operative medicine with updates from leaders and researchers of the various groups. There were also the usual ARS abstract presentations from students, trainees and senior investigators, followed by detailed and insightful questioning from the audience. Successful presentations were eligible for publication in the *British Journal of Anaesthesia*.

The meeting saw keynote presentations from health economists, quality improvers and leading trialists in peri-operative medicine, giving the delegates a unique blend of practical updates all aspects of anaesthesia research. The ARS and the BJA Research Forum are committed to supporting research and you can find out more about how we do this below.





Congratulations to Dundee's **Dr Amy Sadler** (above left) who won the Hughes medal at the meeting for her presentation on learning curves of novice anaesthetists using needle tip tracking technologies. The Mapleson medal was awarded to **Dr Sophie Walker** (above right) for her presentation on sex influences on cardiac dysfunction in early polymicrobial sepsis. Both speakers submitted abstracts to the meeting that were shortlisted by and then scored on the day by a panel of ARS committee members. . 


Next Meeting: BJA Research Forum Spring Scientific Meeting, London 2020



Next Meeting: BJA Research Forum Spring Scientific Meeting, June 16th and 17th 2020 at the RCoA: The meeting will incorporate a BJA Symposium on trauma with themed sessions and keynote speakers. There will be plenty of opportunity to present and defend abstract presentations on a wide variety of topics in the usual format of 8 minutes presentation and 7 minutes of questioning from the audience. Abstracts are invited that describe work relevant to anaesthesia and the related disciplines of perioperative medicine, pain medicine and intensive care medicine. Students, clinicians and experienced researchers and research teams are welcome to submit abstracts, which will be competitively screened against the criteria detailed on the website (www.ars.ac.uk) and invited for oral presentation. All successfully presented abstracts are eligible for publication in the *British Journal of Anaesthesia*, providing they have not been published elsewhere.

We have a number of keynote speakers confirmed, including **Professor Ian Roberts**, who led the CRASH 3 Tranexamic Acid trial. Ian is an engaging speaker who presents



his pioneering research globally. <u>Ian talks about CRASH 3 here.</u> This study represents an enormous effort in studying a difficult clinical problem. Ian will offer a fascinating insight into both the pathophysiology of bleeding and the influence of tranexamic acid and the challenges of running a huge, multi-site, multi-country study.





We are delighted that **Professor Anne Rogers** from Southampton, Professor of Health Systems Implementation and the Research Director of the NIHR CLAHRC Wessex has agreed to speak at the meeting. Anne is a health sociologist with a long term interest in

the sociology of mental health and illness. Anne has agreed to tell us about some of her recent work exploring the impact of companion animals on the mental health of patients..
